There's a short line at the end of Jesus' parable in Luke 5 that has really got me thinking. After talking about the new wine needing new wine skins, He says, "And no one, after drinking old wine, wants the new, for they say, 'the old is better." That is a line that gets me. Because I've lived in that space of continuing with the old wine. I've felt the temptation to reach for what's familiar, even when I know something inside of me has shifted.

For me, this journey of becoming didn't begin with a clear direction. It began with a stirring inside me. It was almost that feeling of my shoe being too tight but loving my pair of shoes so much that I didn't want to take it off. However I knew this wasn't right. In late 2021, I began to sense that I wasn't quite me and it was evident for some time. I had become blinded by the roles and deafened by the noise that I wasn't aligned with my spirit. Then, wow, a shift hit me in the face and I couldn't avoid what I was feeling anymore. My son attempted to end his life. That moment was everything all at once in a very unique way. I felt disappointment in myself, fear of not being able to provide what he needs and a heart ache because my little guy was feeling so challenged. This event also served as a spiritual reckoning. I couldn't ignore the beckoning anymore. This was a surface shattering moment that allowed something deeper to rise up and more intentional transformation to begin.

In early 2022, I began seeking more intentionally through stillness, prayer, and release. It wasn't that I suddenly knew all the answers. I didn't. I had to move on faith and trust. There were moments that were painful and sudden that affected all those around me. There were moments that felt revitalizing, like remembering a version of myself I hadn't seen in so many years. It was at this time that I knew I had changed. No more trying to pour new wine into old skins. This was a tough lesson for those around me as they experienced that I no longer fit that container and the effect it had on them. There were moments in which they recognized I was happier, healthier, and owning my wholeness but it didn't make it easy.

That's what Jesus was saying. Not just that new wine needs a new container, but that most people will try to convince themselves the old is better for them or the ones they know because that's what they have always known. I couldn't do that. I felt the weight of watching us all shift, some with resistance, some with anger, and some silently. I didn't blame anyone for what was happening and I knew that in the end the transformation would produce a butterfly. I am "new wine" and I am learning to build a life that can hold the sacred truth of who I'm becoming.

So, I want to invite you to take a look at your own life. Where have you been tempted to keep drinking the old wine, simply because it's easier than facing the unknown? Transformation doesn't happen all at once and that's okay because the journey is amazing. Are you ready to stretch and be poured into a container that is fit to hold you? Give yourself permission to be "new wine!" You don't have to pretend or compromise being the fullest expression of you. Jesus didn't.
